GENERAL INFORMATION

Course description(s):

Here's the official course description:

Internet legal issues are some of the most important and complex problems facing lawyers and scholars alike in the 21st century. The course will be divided into two parts. The first part will consist of a broad introduction to the legal issues facing the internet; these include intellectual property, jurisdiction, defamation, and more. Of course, even those topics touch on privacy matters; privacy colours everything on the internet. The second part of the course will focus on diving deeply into the legal questions surrounding online privacy and cybersecurity, with a particular interest in comparing the legal regimes of Canada, the United States and Europe, and how the regimes interact in the internet's world without borders.

Throughout the course we will take a practical approach to many of these questions, learning how the courts and the attorneys who practice in this area deal with these issues on a day to day basis.

Assignments & evaluation:

- 1. Final Essay: 75% of final grade
- 2. Participation (including presentation and one-page summary): 25% of final grade

1. Final Essay (75%):

An essay of 4000-5000 words to be submitted through MyCourses during the final exam period, specifically with the deadline December 15th at 3:00 P.M. Essays should be double-spaced in some standard font of 10-12 point size, you go right ahead and choose one. Comic sans is not acceptable and will result in your immediate epic fail.

The final essay will be on a topic of your choice that relates to the course materials, or other topic related to legal aspects of the internet. All essay topics must be approved in advance by the instructor. The deadline for submitting your topic (along with a one paragraph description of the topic) is indicated in the week by week outline below (spoiler alert: October 24) and can be submitted by paper or email at <u>allen@allenmendelsohn.com</u>, or through MyCourses. Essay topics may be adjusted after submission, following discussions with, and / or suggestions from, the instructor.

2. Participation – presentation, one-page summary and general participation (25% total)

Presentation / one-page summary (20%) - Each class, one student (or two) will present / summarize the most important case(s) of the day (marked with a ** in the outline below). One student in each class (or two, depending on the numbers registered in the course) will present a newsworthy item relating to the internet and the potential legal implications thereof. Students are not expected to do any research into "the legal implications thereof", but only to offer their instinctual reactions (though they are welcome to research). A schedule for these presentations will be available on a link from MyCourses for students to sign up. Presentations should be no more than 10 minutes in length. In conjunction with the presentation, students will summarize and / or comment on the case or newsworthy item (as applicable) in a one-page maximum (1.5 line spacing, maximum 12-point font) document to be submitted in paper form on the day of the class; or by email to allen@allenmendelsohn.com or through MyCourses no later than 3 P.M. on the day of class.

General class participation (5%) – The instructor wants to hear your thoughts in class. Students who are less comfortable speaking in class are invited to submit comments about the assigned readings in advance of class to <u>allen@allenmendelsohn.com</u>, or tweet @almendelsohn during class, this will count as participation as well.
